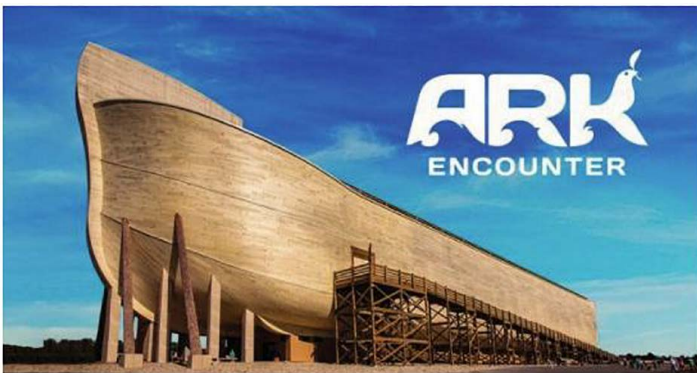

Think beyond shopping.

While you can certainly vote with your dollars, don't forget about your actual vote. "The most powerful thing a consumer can do is become an advocate for more sustainable consumer products for everyone, not just highly educated women of means," Wicker says. She advises contacting your representative to ask tough questions: What are they doing to help standardize recycling systems across the country? How are they working to improve chemical testing and safety? What are they doing about plastic waste? Without pressure from voters, most lawmakers are unlikely to prioritize the planet—so pick up the phone, speak your mind, and help effect change.

DID YOU KNOW?
INDEPENDENCE DAY – JULY 4TH
In June of 1776 Thomas Jefferson, seated in the second-floor parlor of a bricklayer's house in Philadelphia, brilliantly

composed the first drafts of the Declaration of Independence. After some revision, the bulk of the document was approved by Congress on July 4, 1776. While the Declaration would soon become one of the world's most significant documents, its second sentence is perhaps most famous:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

Life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Those words, written over two centuries ago, still resonate in the depths of our hearts, not simply because they are lofty ideals for which we find ourselves compelled to strive, but

because they reflect an aspect of man's irrepressible desire to attain and enjoy human fulfillment.

Upon hearing these words, we are moved to realize that to be human, bestowed as we are with the gift of life and dignity, created in God's image and likeness, is truly spectacular and a blessing.

As Christians we are called to analyze culture, and, aided by the Spirit, heal, elevate and purify those elements within it which run contrary to the Gospel. As Christians, informed by the light of faith, we hold true to the Gospel message.

We are called to become, by faith in Christ, members of the divine family and thus enter the invisible and other-worldly (Jn 18:36) fellowship of the kingdom of God.

Abundant life! While Thomas Jefferson wrote of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness in the context of throwing off a dictatorial British government in favor of an independent nation, Christ speaks of eternal realities which travel inconceivably beyond the temporal, and which will continue with an unending permanency guaranteed by God himself.

However you decide to celebrate Independence Day remember to thank God for all that we have and are. HAPPY 4TH of July.

SUMMER LUNCH PROGRAM: For 10 years, the churches of Shelby have shown the community children and their families love by serving 89,270 meals. Each church takes turns to serve the children for one week in the summer months. Some of the churches serve more than one week, depending when the need arises. Two locations are used to serve the children. One is at Shelby Helpline Ministries (back building), and the other is the south door at Shelby Church of the Nazarene. The children are given a main dish, fruit, vegetable, milk, and a dessert each day from 12:00-1:00 p.m. at either site. They are asked to sign-in so that the churches will have an approximate count for the following day. Approximately 20 people work each week to prepare the meal, deliver to the two stations, and serve the children. Donations are needed to keep this program going each summer. Most Pure Heart of Mary Parish will be helping with the Children's Summer Lunch Program again this year. We will be providing and serving lunches each day from July 23 to 27. We are asking for money donations to buy food and paper products. Please drop donations in the collection basket marked "Summer Lunch Program." Also, if you write a check, please make it out to Most Pure Heart of Mary and mark it for the lunch program. Thank you in advance for your kindness. We appreciate it and so do the children.

Vacation Bible School

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL WRAP UP: First, a huge thank you to the 40 plus children and over 20 volunteers who made this year's Vacation Bible School happen.

This year our VBS focused on the Works of Mercy. Everyday had a new theme. For visit the sick, they made cards for family or friends they knew who were sick. If they didn't know someone who was sick they were asked to make cards for veterans or residents of a care center. For visit the imprisoned, they also made cards to let them know of their prayers. For give shelter to the homeless, they made plastic yarn or plarn which can be made into various things including sleeping mats, blankets, and raincoats. They also made a simulated home with cardboard boxes to help understand the limited space that the homeless may have to live. When the participants learned about praying for the dead, they visited the peace garden to offer up their prayers. They also learned about recycling and the care of the earth. For clothe the naked, they made pillow case dresses, t-shirt totes and more plarn. For give drink to the thirsty, they participated in an activity that simulated how those in other countries may have to walk miles a day for fresh water. For give food to the hungry, they all helped make vegetable soup. The soup was later taken to be served for the free meal that happens every Thursday at the Methodist church. They also made placemats for all who came to dinner that week.

In addition to all the fun activities they did at Bible School they were asked to do a scavenger hunt at home. They brought in donations for a clean water project. They raised \$649.43 in just a week!! They also donated clothes, food, toys, hats, gloves and many other things as a reminder that we should give of what we have to help others, and that if we love our neighbors, we should help them. If you make your neighbors happy, you will be happy too.

It was a great, fun week. We hope you can join us next year.

Reflections on the Readings

13th Sunday In Ordinary Time
taken from St. Joseph Sunday Missal

First Reading – Wisdom 1:13-15; 2:23-24

"By the envy of the devil, death entered the world." If we understand this word of Scripture as referring only to physical death, we run into the problem that the just person also dies. The sacred writer has in mind a spiritual death, which consists in alienation from God and of which biological death is a sign.

It is death by alienation from God, a broken relationship of love, which Jesus Christ overcame by his death and resurrection. Through him human beings who had drifted away can relate to God again in love and have life. This reading introduces the theme of the Gospel on life.

Second Reading – 2 Corinthians 8:7, 9, 13-15

Paul has promised the Church of Jerusalem that he will take up a collection in the churches he has

founded abroad to help the poor in Jerusalem. He urges the congregation of Corinth to be generous and offers motivations for giving. These reasons may also motivate us to be generous in Church support and contribute to help those who are poor.

Gospel – Mark 5:21-24, 35-43

Mark inserts the healing of the woman with the hemorrhage into the tradition concerning the raising of a little girl. Although both miracles prefigure our salvation, we are here limiting ourselves only to the account of Jairus' daughter. Physical death is a sign of that spiritual death which is conscious aversion from God. By overcoming death in this little girl, Jesus prefigures his victory over the death of alienation from God, Mark brings out that Jesus is the prophet of the end-time, who has come to bring life, in other words, to restore our relationship of love with God.
